

WENDY NELSON, Janssen Biotech, Inc., turned a tragedy into an opportunity to serve others. In May 2005, she lost her son, Hunter to a massive seizure, associated with Sturge-Weber Syndrome (SWS), a rare congenital neurological and skin disorder. In honor of her son, she founded, Hunter's Dream for a Cure in 2000. Hunter's Dream raises money for children with SWS and other neurological diseases, as well as programs for special needs children in Colorado and throughout the country. Since its inception, the foundation has raised \$2 million. In 2005, Wendy received the Pathways Achievement Award from the state of Colorado, honoring extraordinary achievements for people with disabilities. In Hunter's memory, the foundation has made a renewed commitment to fight SWS and to make sure that other families do not have to endure the ultimate tragedy of losing a child.
