Our Beneficiaries The Hunter Nelson Sturge-Weber Center at Kennedy Krieser Inc.

The Hunter Nelson Sturge-Weber Center at Kennedy Krieger Institute is located in Baltimore, Maryland. It is devoted to the diagnosis, treatment and research of Sturge-Weber Syndrome (SWS). The center strives to provide comprehensive diagnostic evaluation and coordination of clinical services. It offer patients, their families, and physicians the medical and educational services needed to maximize patient function. Additionally, the center conducts important clinical research to improve the understanding and treatment of the disorder.

The center was founded in October 2002, through Kennedy Krieger's University Center for Excellence in Developmental Disabilities Education, Research and Service collaboration with John's Hopkins University. Since its inception, the center has evaluated, studied, diagnosed, and treated hundreds of SWS patients from around the world, ranging from day-old babies to adults in their sixties.

"Funding from Hunter's Dream for a Cure has been critical in the creation and ongoing efforts of the research center. Children's Care Hospital & School is an independent, non-profit organization with centers in Sioux Falls and Rapid City, SD, which annually serves over 2600 children with special needs from birth to age 21. It was established in 1952 for children recovering from polio, and has evolved to serve children with a wide range of physical, cognitive, and behavioral challenges.

Services include special education, therapies (speech, occupational, physical, behavioral, and music), autism/behavioral services, medical care, and rehabilitation programs. Care is delivered through outreach programs, with professionals traveling across the state to treat children in their homes and schools; outpatient centers in Sioux Falls and Rapid City; plus a 114-bed residential program and 14-classroom school in Sioux Falls.

The Breckenridge Outdoor Education Center (BOEC) is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to expand the potential of people with disabilities and special needs through meaningful, educational and inspiring outdoor experiences. The BOEC began back in 1976 with a staff that consisted of volunteers only, gear from their closets and donated food provided by the clients. The BOEC offers Adaptive Skiing and Snowboarding, Wilderness Courses, Professional Challenge Courses, and a unique Internship Program.

The BOEC has something for everyone. Educational experiences are offered for people with physical, cognitive, and sensory disabilities, people from low-income backgrounds or disadvantaged environments, people looking for more team unity in their workplace, people learning English as their second language. . . the list goes on and on.

An estimated two percent of all children up to three years of age experience significant developmental conditions or delays. Studies have proven there are critical windows for visual, speech, motor, and social development during the first years of life. Therefore, the earlier a development delay or disability is identified, the greater the impact of therapy and other early intervention services can be.

The Children's Hospital and Alliance, a group that manages and delivers community-based services to more than 11,000 children and adults with developmental delays and disabilities and their families, host Early Childhood Intervention Awareness Day. The event is designed to ensure that parents, community leaders, elected officials, and policy makers understand the importance of supporting early intervention efforts in their communities.

Our Beneficiaries



Developmental Pathways is a Colorado nonprofit agency created to serve persons with developmental disabilities and their families. It was established in 1964 as a community-based alternative to institutional care. Since that time, Pathways has developed a broad array of services based on the principle that full inclusion and participation in community life are attainable for every individual with a developmental disability. Developmental Pathways vision is to provide innovative and effective services characterized by self-direction, choice and respect for people with developmental disabilities and their families.

The first and only universally-accessible playground in Colorado, Inspiration Playground provides a unique experience for the region. In addition to benefiting children with special needs, integrated play gives typically-abled children the opportunity to experience and appreciate their peers with special needs, thus dissolving damaging misconceptions about physical limitations.

The equipment at the playground is accessible and usable by children with disabilities. This free, outdoor play environment provides safe, state-of-the-art, sensory-rich structures that encourage integration and the development of cognitive, emotional, physical, and social skills. It offers a play surface that allows for wheelchairs and support braces - unlike common sand playgrounds in our communities.

Poudre Valley Health Systems offers a family-centered children's therapy program. Their objective is to help children and parents reach goals for their community, home and play, by creating fun, effective therapy programs based on the interests and needs of the child and family.

The rehabilitation program is staffed by experienced professionals who specialize in - and love working with - children ranging from newborns to teens. Children's needs may be related to: Autism, cerebral palsy, cleft lip and palate, Down's Syndrome and other genetic syndromes, feeding, eating or swallowing conditions, head injuries, orthopedic impairments/injuries, attention-sensory processing disorders, to name just a few.

Outdoors Without Limits (OWL) seeks to educate those with disabilities about activities in the outdoors and offer the opportunity to participate. Nearly 250,000 people each year stop pursuing outdoor passions due to illness or accident. Many thousands more, born with disabilities, have never had the opportunity to experience the woods and water. OWL's program is designed to increase awareness, resources and opportunities that directly impact people and the communities where they live. They strive to challenge stereotypes about disability and promote awareness of "ability" in a positive environment.




In Memory of Hunter Nelson - November 5, 1999 to May 29, 2005

Hunter's Dream for a Cure is a non-profit organization established in 2000 by Robb & Wendy Nelson in the name of their son, Hunter, who was diagnosed with Sturge-Weber Syndrome (SWS) when he was seven months old. On May 20th, 2005 we unexpectedly lost Hunter to a massive seizure. Needless to say this has been a monumental & devastating loss. In Hunter's memory our foundation has made a renewed commitment to fight this disease and try to make sure that other families do not have to go through the ultimate tragedy of losing a child! SWS is a rare brain disease with no cure or definitive prognosis for those afflicted with it. Symptoms associated with SWS include seizures, glaucoma, cognitive, motor and neurological deficits, eye and internal organizegularities. Hunter's Dream raises money for children with SWS, other neurological diseases and programs for special needs children. Through our fundraising events, the Dave Diaz-Infante Mark Schlereth Charity Golf Classic, the Celebrity Hunt for a Cure and the Denim & Diamonds Gala, we have raised more than \$900,000 since our inception. Our efforts were recognized in 2004 when we received the Frances Owens Communities Helping Young Children Award presented by the former First Lady of Colorado for demonstrating outstanding support for early childhood intervention and support programs in Colorado. In 2005 Robb & Wendy received the Pathways Achievement Award from the state of Colorado, honoring extraordinary achievements for people with disabilities.



Hunter's Dream for a Cure has presented The Kennedy Krieger Institute & Johns Hopkins Sturge-Weber Syndrome Center with checks to date totaling \$525,000. Our funding helped establish the Center, which was the first of its kind. As a result of our funding and Hunter's passing, the Center was renamed the Hunter Nelson Sturge-Weber Center. The Center takes a multidisciplinary approach to evaluating and treating all medical issues associated with SWS. Long-term research goals of the Center include the development of clinical trials aimed at improved treatment for those affected by SWS and hopefully an eventual cure.

Hunter's Draam For A Cure has presented \$75,000 to Colorado's own Developmental Pathways. The Developmental Pathways' funded program assists children with special needs in the public school setting and provides training to teachers. Inspiration Playground has also received \$50,000 from Hunter's Dream For A Cure to build the first universally-accessible playground in Colorado. Inspiration Playground is an outdoor play environment that includes safe, state of the art structures that enables every child – able bodied and disabled – to play independently on the same equipment. Other Colorado beneficiaries including Poudre Valley Children's Orthotic & Prosthetic Fund, Windsor Boardwalk Playground Project, Early Childhood Intervention, Breckenridge Outdoor Education Center, Wheelin' Sportsman, Outdoors Without Limits, Tony Semple Foundation, Union Colony Children's Music Academy, 24/7 Kids - Support for Families, Inc., Rehabilitation and Visiting Nurse Association and many more have received over \$250,000 from Hunter's Dream for a Cure.
